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
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



Tim Atkins, Director of Religious Education

When I think of Diversity within Unitarian Universalism, I think there are things we do a great job with and things that we don't always do such a great job with. During the month of

February as we explore diversity in the beloved community, I hope that all of us reflect both what we do well here at the Morristown Unitarian Fellowship and what we still need to work on. When we think of diversity, our mind's typically default to racial diversity – and although this is essential, we should examine diversity in other areas as well.

We do a good job with theological and philosophical diversity. We have done a great job of embracing religious pluralism and incorporating wisdom from different religious traditions into our worship live, personal spiritual life, and religious education programs. This congregation is more pluralistic and religiously diverse than many in our movement, and it's something that I am proud of.

We are doing a better job with diversity of age. We have grown both older and younger here at the Fellowship over the past few years – we have a growing children's and youth program with young families, we have a blossoming young adult group, and our octogenarian group is going strong! We are one of only two UU Congregations with a young adult group, and the other has a paid staff organizer. We aren't all the way there with diversity of age, but we're making real progress and should be proud of how far we've come.


We still need to work on racial diversity, however. How are we transforming our congregation to be more welcoming to people of color? How are we transforming ourselves to be more welcoming to people of color? How are we transforming our own UU/Fellowship Cultural Norms to be more welcome to people of color? Every UU congregation struggles with racial diversity and there is no magic bullet. I firmly believe that if we truly want our congregation to become more racially diverse, we have to do internal work first and we have to examine our congregational cultural norms.

We need to think about diversity of worship styles. Right now most of our worship services are of the typical protestant variety and that's what we typically default to as Unitarian Universalists. I personally think that no single worship style works for every person – what would it look like if every so often we had a non-traditional service? A regular participatory worship service? A Sunday Evening service once a month? What would it look like if we were to offer a Spanish-language service once a month or once a week?

We're entering a time in the life of this Fellowship where we have the opportunity to explore new ways of doing church – we should take this chance to look at how we can increase diversity in different facets of the church. A diverse congregation offers us the chance to reach people who are looking for a spiritual home. Diverse programming offers us the chance to explore new ideas and concepts on our spiritual journeys, and just possibly help us discover the answer we've been looking for.

Social Justice

Bill Reed's Program a Resounding Success!

At the Fellowship on January 16, Bill Reed, an internationally known thought leader and distinguished architect, enthralled more than 140 attendees in a 4-hour program, "Collaborating with Nature: It's Not Just About Lightbulbs."

Participants in the program, which was sponsored and organized by Green Earth Ministry, Seeds of Peace, and Garden



State Earth Institute, learned of creative, successful approaches to restoration and regeneration of our Earth home. Bill invited attendees to popcorn-style their questions, and so they did, non-stop, and with gusto!

From vivid photographs and descriptions of projects including the Willow School in Gladstone, a boutique eco-hotel in Mexico, a wastewater treatment plant in Vancouver, and a coastal city in Chile, we began to understand the importance of thinking systemically and of building relationships (asking, "how do you live?") before trying to solve problems.

Other capsules of insight: life harmonizes whereas compromise concedes; sustainability is a slower way to die; look for patterns the way a tracker does; look at the historical record for a location when planning its restoration; treat the Earth as a partner rather than an industrial resource; a dualistic view of life separates people from nature; to solve a problem, enlarge your view of it. During the refreshment break, the loud buzz of networking and energy exchange was prominent. As Bill emphasized, we are all co-learners, and it is essential that we learn by "being with each other."

Social Justice

Here's What You Had To Say

(In the Social Justice Council Reinvention Task Force Survey Monkey survey)

You may have participated in a survey last November for the Social Justice Council Reinvention Task Force. In fact, 106 of our members answered the survey. If you're wondering what the congregation had to say, here it is:

More than 90% say a "vibrant SJ program at the Fellowship is important or extremely important and about half say they have some knowledge but want to know more about our social and environmental justice efforts. 26% of the congregation would like to be more involved in social/environmental justice work. There are so many different ways to contribute to our social/environmental initiatives. Many are interested in doing service work such as the soup kitchen (70%), but 30-45% of respondents are interested in other ways: education, advocacy, witness, or community organizing.

Many of you would like to see the social/environmental justice council collaborating more deeply with other arms of the Fellowship: with Religious Education (85%), sunday services (65%), and denominational affairs (75%).

Most of you would like more communication from the social/environmental council. Members want to hear about activities and impact (85%), where funds are allocated (75%), and opportunities to get involved (73%). You'd like to get this information from our monthly newsletter (84%), from the website or What's Happening (55%), from a bulletin board (46%), or during Sunday services (40%). And about a third of respondents wanted information from other sources, including Facebook, the weekly email blast, tables after some services or a regular email blast of volunteer opportunities.

An extra thank you to the many respondents who added comments; they were thoughtful and so helpful. A common theme was the desire for greater focus. Many commented on the need to include environmental issues and several members said they would like to know where plate collections are going ahead of time. These and other comments have provided valuable input to our task force's work. We are continuing our work to structure the social/environmental initiatives at MUF to reflect the passions of our members and for optimum impact and accountability. You'll hear more about this in future newsletters and in our Sunday information sessions. So stay tuned!


